Concept

According to a 2016 report by the ILO, more than 40 million people worldwide are victims of trafficking in persons, and the problem is particularly serious in Asia. Religions for Peace Japan launched the Prevention of Trafficking in Persons Taskforce in 2020 and has been working on the issues of technical interns in Japan and sexual exploitation in the Philippines. In July last year, we delivered a statement to the Japanese government that included an action plan to raise awareness activities in Religions for Peace network and collaboration with government agencies, international organizations. and NGOs. The issue of human trafficking is a cross-border challenge, especially in Southeast Asian countries. This visit to the shelter online, co-organized with Religions for Peace Indonesia, will be an opportunity for participants to learn together and consider actions to prevent labor exploitation.

About Rumah Harapan GMIT

GMIT is a religious organization of the Protestant Church in Indonesia. In response to the high incidents of human trafficking and violence against women and children in the region, GMIT organized Rumah Harapan to work with the police government agencies, churches, and communities since February 2018.
